

Wren ★ Feathers

Lottie's sleeping bag/carrying pouch


Shhh...Lottie is sleeping 😊



This adorable owl is quick and inexpensive to make, needing only 2 sheets of standard size felt and tiny scraps for the eyes and beak. Have fun experimenting with your favorite color combinations and make each of your Lotties their own bag! If you're looking for a project to use to help you teach hand sewing to a child, this is a great choice. The eyes, beak, feathers and wings could be sewed on by hand with a variety of stitches.



1. Layer 1: sew on eyes
2. Layer 2: Topstitch lower part of face, sew inner curve of wings, sew on feathers at top edge, buttonhole stitch around beak.



Sew layer 2 to layer 1 around the top of head and face. The bottom of face you topstitched earlier stays open




Pin back wings to sew lower body layers together. Put wings back in place and topstitch outer edge if desired.



Up to 2 Lotties can fit at once to use as a sleeping bag or make it into a convertible carrying pouch/sleeping bag by adding a removable strap:


1. Put 1-2 layers of strong interfacing in the ear tufts before sewing it shut.
2. Put grommets in the owl's ear tufts and attach small carabiners or hooks to the ends of a fabric strap. Alternatively, sew buttons to the owl's ear tufts and make a fabric strap with buttonholes at the ends. Make sure your button stitching is very strong, since it will get a lot of stress.










